PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

Background

Wildlife At Risk (WAR) is dedicated to protecting the biodiversity of Vietnam by combating the illegal wildlife trade, raising environmental awareness and promoting the conservation of endangered species and their habitats.

WAR is a non-profit organization, registered in Delaware on 5th October 2003. It is based in Ho Chi Minh City ("HCMC") and active throughout the southern provinces of Vietnam.

Vietnam's wildlife faces a desperate fight for survival in the 21st century. Without urgent intervention, many of the country's endangered species will soon be wiped out. They are being driven to extinction by habitat loss, hunting, pollution and, above all, the flourishing illegal wildlife trade. WAR aims to reduce the pressure on Vietnam's threatened biodiversity by helping to build local capacity to implement legislation, raise environmental awareness and develop alternatives to the unsustainable exploitation of natural resources.

Responding to specific priorities identified by local government, and working with appropriate specialists and project partners, WAR focuses on three interlocking themes:

- Enforcement – Action to reduce the exploitation of endangered species and to support the confiscation, rehabilitation and possible release of illegal traded wildlife;
- Raising awareness – Influencing behaviour, changing attitudes to wildlife and promoting sustainable use of natural resources; and
- Protection in the wild – In site conservation to safeguard specific endangered species and their habitats.

WAR ANNUAL REVIEW 2010-2011

Overview

2010 – 2011 has been a challenging year for conservation and wildlife protection with the unfortunate death of the Javan Rhino (*Rhinoceros sondaicus annamiticus*) and the re-occurring deaths of Vietnams' last remaining Asian elephants (*Elephas maximus*). Wildlife At Risk (WAR) believes that the key to saving Vietnams' unique biodiversity and ecosystems is through local education and the continuing development of education aimed and focused at school students.

During 2010 - 2011, WAR continues to complete its mission on three main target areas: Enforcement, Awareness and Protection. Our conservation mission has had remarkable results recording 14 new species for Vietnam some of which are listed as endangered species. The biodiversity surveys conducted by WAR are generating more public interest due to the release of scientific information to the local community, this links to WAR's public awareness campaign. WAR has launched several action plans evaluating the public's awareness on the conservation of wildlife as well as educational events towards national and international students. The combination of conservation activities and raising public awareness on the protection of wildlife has been a major focus for WAR this year. Our work has been recognised by local communities via local media and newspapers and helps us enforce our activities nationwide. School students have joined staff from wildlife rescue station's releasing successfully rehabilitated wildlife back to the forest. Wildlife rescue staff in this year (2010 – 2011) are busier compared to previous years this is reflected in the amount of wildlife the Cu Chi Wildlife Rescue Station (CCWRS) has received in the first six months of 2011: 550 individuals, more than previously received in 2010.


During this financial year, WAR has officially operated seven projects divided between conservation, enforcement and public awareness. WAR currently conducts its work in four provinces in Vietnam: Ho Chi Minh City; Kien Giang, Dong Nai and Quang Ngai. All of WAR's projects aim to protect the biodiversity of Vietnam and results are shared with local partners and communities. Brief outlines of our projects can be found in WAR's quarterly newsletter and detailed results found on the WAR website: www.wildlifeatrisk.org.

The overall budget for 2010 - 2011 is approximately USD550,000. The majority of the budget has been spent on the continued development and maintenance of on-going projects such as: Cu Chi Wildlife Rescue Station (CCWRS); Cat Tien Bear Sanctuary and Wild Cat Rescue Station (CTWRS) and Hon Me Wildlife Rescue Station (HMWRS). These projects are operating successfully with the support of local authorities, participation of local people and donations from the international community.

A significant activity for WAR is to involve local communities, in which school students are priority because they are the future generation to care for Vietnam's nature. This action could be seen as a sustainable way to conserve and protect wildlife or preserve the remaining forests of Vietnam.

WAR continues to build on its positive relationships with the Forestry Protection Department (FPD) in HCMC and throughout Vietnam, as well as with the Kien Giang Union of Friendship Organisation (KUFO) and Cat Tien National Park. In addition, WAR received support from international experts for several biological surveys on the subjects of conservation and biodiversity protection highlighting WAR's commitment towards Vietnams' unique biodiversity.

Enforcement

This year, the Cu Chi Wildlife Rescue Station (CCWRS) was officially operating in its fourth year (officially launched in August 2007). The number of wildlife rescue cases at Cu Chi has increased gradually in the first two years and sharply this year, 2010 - 2011. This reflects that enforcement activities around Ho Chi Minh City and neighbouring provinces are working in a positive manner. More than 850 individuals have been delivered to CCWRS and almost 800 animals has been successfully rehabilitated and released back to the wild. All released animals undergo thorough health-checks under the supervision of WAR's Veterinary staff and husbandry staff.

Beside CCWRS, the Cat Tien Bear Sanctuary and Wild Cat Rescue Station (CTWRS) acts as a sanctuary for rescued bears and wild cats from neighbouring provinces and gives wildlife a chance to live in semi-natural enclosures. This project is a official collaboration between Wildlife At Risk and Cat Tien National Park from 2011 – 2013. Cat Tien WRS has become home to 10 more rescued bears and WAR has expanded this project with new infrastructures

both for public use and also rescued wildlife that includes a new perimeter fence, climbing frames, visitor viewing platform and new information signs in both Vietnamese and English.

Supporting the rescue stations is the mobile unit that operates daily in HCMC. The project has been a great success on its approach to strike illegal trading of wildlife on the streets and restaurants. The project is also a great practical model for WAR's partners and warns traders of wildlife. This project has been terminated at the end of this financial year (June 2011). More than 600 wildlife individuals have been confiscated by the mobile team in last 12 months with the majority being transferred to CCWRS for rehabilitation.

Even though the rescue facilities are busy with a large amount of wildlife coming to all rescue centres in last 12 months. WAR still focus's on expanding its scale of work and is always willing to rescue large animals, such as bears. In the last six months, WAR has collected information from a new partner with the potential to receive a new plot of land close to the forest in a safe large semi-natural area close to the Cu Chi tunnels. WAR prepares for this new challenge in the new financial year furthering developing our working relationship with local partners and donors and highlighting WAR's commitment towards wildlife protection and conservation.

This year has been an extremely busy and successful time at all wildlife rescue centres with a sharp increase in numbers of wildlife being received at each rescue centre. WAR's name often appears on media and in local newspaper highlighting our positive work towards saving Vietnams' Unique Wildlife.

Raising Awareness

WAR starting enhancing its work in local schools in 2009, this year 2010 – 2011 WAR continues to strength its activities focusing on conservation to educate school students. WAR's long-term strategy, includes activities and presentations that are always carefully prepared to attract students and educate them how to help save Vietnam's wildlife in future.

Based on the knowledge of Vietnams unique ecosystems, information on Vietnam's wildlife as well as results of on-going projects, WAR has implemented several public events in which images of endangered wildlife and their conservation status was provided to the public with the aid of other Non Governmental Organisation's (NGO's).

WAR welcomes more visitors, both to the Cu Chi Wildlife Rescue Station and the Cat Tien Bear Sanctuary and Wild Cat Rescue Station where the public can observe non-releasable wildlife in semi-natural environments. Students are able to participate releasing native fresh water fish species into the Saigon River that WAR has bred at its head office. More field trip are available to students to learn and explore native forests in protected areas around Ho Chi Minh City. These activities bring visual lessons to children and the public and also address people on WAR's message: "Live and Think Please".

The on-going upgrade visitor platform at the Cat Tien Bear Sanctuary and Wild Cat Rescue Station will be an attractive addition for guests with interesting information on species being rescued at this site. The bears display natural behaviours such as swimming, climbing trees, hiding in bushes, foraging for food items, hunting their prey, all these behaviours can be observed from a safe distance. Learning directly by observing these creatures in a semi-natural environment is an efficient method for both children and adults. The combination of rescuing wildlife and interpretation of WAR's outcomes of biodiversity survey providing conservation education is one of WAR's strengths on raising public awareness. This approach reflects WAR work and sharing its information to the public based on actual data and visual outcomes from rescue stations and surveys is vital to improving local knowledge.

Based on the successful cooperation with the popular children's magazines, **BAO RUA VANG** and **KHAN QUANG DO** in the previous year, WAR continues expanding its cooperation with these magazines to provide more information and develop several activities with green clubs from school students. Providing students with more opportunities to interact (**LIVE**) with conservation wildlife **AND** learn (**THINK**) difficulties on rescuing wildlife. WAR believes that practical lessons' will impress students and Vietnam will have more young conservationists in the future. WAR is committed to continuing this mission of public awareness in following years.

Reflecting on the recent threats of endangered wildlife including the death of Vietnams' Javan Rhino (*Rhinoceros sondaicus annamiticus*) and the continuing illegal poaching of Vietnams' last remaining Elephants (*Elephas maximus*). WAR is calling for the public and younger generation to protect the remaining natural heritage of Vietnam by becoming actively involved in any upcoming public events WAR holds and also by visiting the WAR website at: www.wildlifeatrisk.org

Protection in the Wild

Protection in the wild, in-situ conservation is always a priority approach for WAR. WAR has also entered several direct projects of surveying endangered wildlife and its habitat. The outcomes of these surveys are always fully shared to WAR's partners and other relevant agencies to co-operate and conserve species in the wild.

This year, WAR not only continued to survey Phu Quoc National Park (Kien Giang Province), it expanded geographically to two new sites: U Minh Thuong National Park in the Mekong Delta and the mountainous area of Ba To District in Quang Ngai Province (Central Vietnam). The new areas are challenging WAR on resources and provide more interesting scientific information for our local partners and the public highlighting the importance of conservation.

WAR wishes to thank all experienced volunteers that have aided in the field surveys. WAR always updates information of new findings of endangered species to the public and partners to seek new solutions on how to protect species in the wild. The survey outcomes also bring more interesting information for our partners.

The initial checklist of species discovered during each survey is always shared immediately to WAR's partners. New information on species helps our partners' on managing information and the understanding of their forests' species richness. Images and video clips are also shared and are provided to partners and WAR's wildlife education team for future educational campaigns'.

Beside these biodiversity surveys, WAR has supported several individuals and students to do some direct work in conservation such as: breeding of native freshwater fish species, planting native orchids and trees for habitat conservation. Even though these are minimal projects. WAR believes that these actions benefit Vietnam and the conservation of its unique environment and its wildlife.

Human Resources

This year more staff have been recruited by WAR and assigned to the public awareness mission. WAR continues its policy on training and gives greater responsibility to local Vietnamese staff from this year and concentrates on mentoring local partners on site to ensure the long-term sustainability of its current projects. This year, WAR has recruited four national veterinary surgeons and one more veterinary assistant that were trained at the University of Agriculture and Forestry of Ho Chi Minh City.

Increased staff recruitment will greatly support the managers of the wildlife rescue stations and help develop their personal skills and techniques.

Beside the local human resources, WAR 've also recieved a number of more than 50 volunteers come to work and share difficulties with WAR staff at the rescue stations in the last 12 months. This is a great support to WAR for completion our missions.

Scope

Notes to the statement of receipts and payments for the year ended 30 June 2011

These notes form an integral part of, and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying statement of receipts and payments.

1. Summary of significant accounting policies

The following significant accounting policies have been adopted by Wildlife At Risk in the preparation of this statement.

(a) Basis of preparation

The statement of receipts and payments, expressed in United States Dollars (“USD”), has been prepared in accordance with the cash receipts and disbursements basis. This is a basis of accounting that is designed to meet the requirements of Wildlife at Risk; it is not designed to produce a statement of receipts and payments that is compatible with International Financial Reporting Standards. On this basis, income is recognised when received rather than when earned; advances to project staff are recorded as expenditure when the advances are liquidated; other expenditure is recognised when paid rather than when incurred.

(b) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in currencies other than USD during the year have been translated into USD at the rates approximating those ruling at the transaction dates.

(c) Non-expendable equipment

The cost of non-expendable equipment is charged to expenditure upon acquisition.
